- Engaged in the harmonization of standards and the development of conformity assessment procedures
- 43 African governments represented by National Standards Bodies (NSBs)

1.2. ARSO Mandate

The mandate of ARSO, as provided for by the Constitution

- Harmonise national and/or sub-regional standards as African Standards and issue necessary recommendations to member bodies for this purpose;
- 2. Initiate and co-ordinate the development of African Standards (ARS) with references to products which are of peculiar interest to Africa;
- 3. Encourage and facilitate adoption of international standards by member bodies;
- 4. Promote and facilitate exchange of experts, information and co-operation in training of personnel in standardization activities;
- 5. Co-ordinate the views of its members at ISO, IEC, OIML, Codex and other international organisations concerned with standardisation activities; and
- 6. Create appropriate bodies in addition to the organs of the organisation for the purposes of fulfilling its objectives.



2.3 ARSO Interventions in FSS (2)



- ARSO operates a Regional certification system through ARSO CACO:
- Enables member states to produce and offer goods/products and services of consistent and improved quality through the harmonization of common quality control, inspection and testing activities
- Gives confidence/assurance to consumers that the product has been tested against the requirements (sanitary, Phytosanitary, technical regulations) of the targeted markets
- Designed to certify quality and promote African products
- Eco-mark Africa: awarded to goods and services that demonstrate environmental, economic and social sustainability within the established legal framework of the country of production.
- Awarded on products certified to African standards alongside national brands.





- Capacity building of farmers, SMES, auditors, certification bodies, TC experts is provided to facilitate in the implementation of harmonised standards including food safety Management systems
- From 3rd to 5th October, 31 SMEs from 12 members countries were trained on standards, certification requirements and GMP on insects for food and feeds (KEBS has published 4 stds on insectes)


